Using Guest Judges and Competition to Enhance Group Work for Students in Online and On Campus Classes (with Melody Vaught in H-119) Can you think of a career that doesn't require workers to collaborate or work on a team or in a group? Yet, college students abhor group work because: one or two group members do not participate; one or two group members do all of the work; and, students complain that it is unfair that grades are based on the group project deliverable or outcome. Learn how to incorporate competition and guest judges to enhance group work for online and on campus classes while providing students with the opportunity to become productive group members and flex their leadership skills. Plus, learn a method for fairly grading group work. Presentation followed by brainstorming session on how to use these tools for courses in any discipline.

The Who, What, and Where of Hawk's Nest: SCC Food Pantry (with Beth Hoffman, Tiffany Gause, Karen Bustamante, and John Hernandez in H-209-4) In the fall of 2015, a number of faculty, administrators, and students came together to discuss food insecurity on campus. As part of this effort, SCC participated in the American College Health Association, National College Health Assessment. To determine prevalence, five supplemental questions were posed to students around food insecurity. These questions allowed SCC to gauge levels of food security among students and their likelihood to continue with academic endeavors. We would like to have a dialogue with faculty and staff about how this service will be realized. Topics for discussion will include the prevalence of food insecurity among SCC students, support for students on campus, the proposed location, funding structure, volunteer need, and accepted foods.
