1. Approval of Prior Minutes April 23, 2018 Meeting	Syed Rizvi will follow up with Davis Barber regarding the videos. The updated Student Services video will be presented at the 2019 Spring Convocation.	Ruth Babeshoff motioned to approve; Nena Baldizon-Rios seconded and the April 23, 2018 minutes were approved by the committee.
NEW BUSINESS & UPDATES		
1. Student Equity, BSI/BSIT, SSSP Updates (Joseph Alonzo, Maureen Roe, Ruth Babeshoff & Rudy Frias)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <u>BSI/BSIT</u> – Syed Rizvi distributed Maureen Roe’s update report. Ruth Babeshoff noted October is the last month to use placement testing, however the Testing Center is currently inputting scores manually, so the reality is placement testing will only be used through summer. The committee is continuing to work on assessment ideas for non-traditional populations, such as international students, veterans, returning students, etc. Alicia Frost reported the Math Department is using CCCApply for placement and using CANVAS for additional questions. Acceleration classes appear to be working well and producing a higher success rate than anticipated. • <u>SSSP (Credit)</u> – Ruth Babeshoff reported BSI/BSIT, Student Equity and SSSP will be combined next year and noted the need for campus based research for various demographics and ethnicities. Counseling will be relocated to the third floor of the E-building for the summer. • <u>Student Equity</u> – Joseph Alonzo reported Jovannys Mejia has accepted the Student Services Coordinator (PT) position for the Food Pantry. He also acknowledged Bill Jeffery’s efforts for always going above and beyond to not only help with the Food Pantry, but SCC students and staff throughout the campus. The Equity Team is in the process of proctoring surveys in 92 classes and is hoping for an 80% return rate. Proctors will engage in a follow up discussion on how to improve communications with the deans and faculty and involve disengaged students. • <u>SSSP (Noncredit)</u> – Rosa Salazar De La Torre submitted five proposals to BSIT to fund CE part-time counselors to work on summer projects. The proposals are designed to provide direct instruction of counseling themes best known as “embedded counseling sessions,” to students at three CE 	Syed Rizvi will make a recommendation to College Council to recognize SCC’s “Unsung Heroes” during convocation.

Rudy Frias thanked Student Equity for sponsoring students to attend the Pathways to Teaching conference.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The committee reviewed and responded to questions to the End-of-Year survey. • Alicia Frost reported MaSH will keep its name the same until the noncredit course gets approved by the Chancellor's Office (expected to start in Intersession 2019). Curriculum for the Math Success Center's noncredit lab course was approved in curriculum yesterday. Now the program will need to be approved at the state level. Making the change to a noncredit course will increase FTEs by 163% (based on two years of apportionment data). The change will also make the center free for students. In addition to changing the course from credit to noncredit, Jessica Kramer and Alicia Frost will be writing modules in Canvas to support student learning for basic skills topics. They will also start a more rigorous and frequent seminar schedule to better assist students who might need a little more help in their math course (seminars and modules expected to start as early as fall 2018).
