Aguilar-Hernández, Professor of Educational Leadership & Director of the Office for Interdisciplinary Ethnic Studies (OIES) at Cal Poly Pomona – in SC-105) In this talk, Dr. Aguilar-Hernández situates Hispanic-Serving Institutions into historical and contemporary context. Using demographic data, oral history, and archival research, Aguilar-Hernández frames the growth of HSI's as a direct result to Latina/o/x student activism and demographic shifts that led to initiatives to improve the high school to college pipeline for racially minoritized students. Furthermore, Aguilar-Hernández frames the possibilities and challenges that the current socio-political context presents, including attacks on DEI efforts nationally. He also discusses Garcia et al.'s (2019) "servingness framework," and promotes that organizational outcomes and culture need to include and reflect Latina/o/x students, to move beyond being only a "Latinx-enrolling," to a "Latinx-serving" HSI. Aguilar-Hernández invites attendees to identify in what ways they can improve servingness to Latina/o/x students within their roles. Dr. José M. Aguilar-Hernández is a Professor of Educational Leadership in the College of Education and Integrative Studies and Director of the Office of Interdisciplinary Ethnic Studies Teaching and Scholarship (OIES) at Cal Poly Pomona. Dr. Aguilar-Hernández is a first-generation academic, whose trajectory in higher education began at Moorpark Community College. He transferred to UCLA, where he received his B.A. in History and Chicana/o Studies, M.A. in Latin American Studies, and Ph.D. in Education. He was trained by Dr. Daniel G. Solórzano, whose teaching interests include higher education, Latina/o/x students, student movements, and critical pedagogy. Using critical race theory in education & historical methods, Aguilar-Hernández's research and teaching interests include higher education, Asitori at me
	Aguilar-Hernández was awarded Advisor of the Year in 2024 and 2017 by the CPP College of Education and Integrative Studies. He serves as faculty coordinator of the CPP/Pomona Unified School District (PUSD) Ethnic Studies Dual Enrollment Program, a three-year program that enrolls high school students in "Introduction to Ethnic Studies," a course that grants PUSD students with high school and college credit. Aguilar-Hernández is one of 18 scholars across the United States selected to the American Educational Research Association's (AERA) Ethnic Studies Education research group, tasked to advance a national research agenda on ethnic studies. In spring of 2023, Aguilar-Hernández received the American Association for Hispanics in Higher Education (AAHHE) Faculty Fellowship Program's Service Award, for his leadership in developing a program to support tenure-track Latinx faculty across the United States.
